LEEDing By Example

Gold Standard for Jackson HQ

Jackson Contractor Group, Inc. (JCG) is delighted to announce our world head-quarters, just south of Missoula, Montana, has recently received LEED Gold Certification for New Construction from the U.S. Green Building Council. Our new two story, 5000 square foot office building commenced construction in April of 2008, and was completed in October of the same year.

Our new facility utilizes a steel and insulated concrete panel structural frame which provides both functionality and a urban, loft-like interior. The design provides natural day-lighting and endless views of the mountains, valley, Bitterroot River and Highway 93 for all of our employees. We have brought the outside in with mounted trophy salmon, trout and an artificial owl to keep the robins away from our CFO, Bill Simmel. Polished recycled glass infused concrete floors, native landscaping, rapidly renewable and recycled wood trims and furnishings are a few of the other innovative elements included in the design of our office. Heated floors keep the office Labrador, Maggie, warm in the winters and, when they are turned off, cool in the summer. And the movie theatre style popcorn machine adds to our indoor air quality.

With Jackson Contractor Group's growing family, there had to be room to expand. With room to the north, it will be easy to add to the needs of our company in the future, but a plan to build skyward is also being taken into consideration.

LEEDing By Example Continued...

The LEED rating system is point based; projects earn points for satisfying specific sustainable building criteria in nine categories, including Sustainable Sites, Water Efficiency, Energy & Atmosphere, Materials & Resources, Indoor Environmental Quality, Locations & Linkage, Awareness & Education, Innovation in Design, and Regional Priority. The number of points the project earns determines the level of LEED Certification the project receives; Certified, Bronze, Silver, Gold and the highest level, Platinum.

Anticipated LEED

It is anticipated that four more of our current projects will be certified LEED very soon. The new Payne Family Native American Studies Center on the University of Montana, Missoula, campus is seeking a platinum rating from the USGBC. There are currently only two other buildings in the entire state with the status of Platinum. Garlington, Lohn, Robinson, the new office building gracing downtown Missoula, Montana, Rocky

Mountain Laboratories, Building 7 in Hamilton, and the State Hospital in Warm Springs will be attempting Gold certification.

Most Common Accidents in Construction

- 29 % of construction accidents are from handling accidents
- 22% are from slipping and tripping
- Falling from a height accounts for 17% of all construction accidents (compared to 8% of accidents in all industries)
- 16% are from moving or falling objects (compared to an overall 11%)
- Contact with moving machinery, electricity and collapse/overturns all had a higher occurrence in construction than in other industries.
